Blue Dance

CDR rocked the house on September 29 and February 2 with the unique stylings of Blue Dance, a compulsively danceable swing/R&B/blues band that has been heating up area dance floors for nearly a decade. They move smoothly through classics by such luminaries as Duke Ellington, Elvis, Sam Cooke, Stevie Wonder, and the Manhattans.

Sammy DiFranco's vocals are first-rate. Other regular members of the band are Chuck Abell, Ernesto LaBella, Mike Stutzman, Tom Henderson, and Eric Metzger. They are joined by top-notch horn players, typically Eastman students, to emphasize the big band sound. Mike Hoeschle also joins in on fiddle to provide some traditional contra melodies as a counterpoint to the rock and roll pieces. Our own Chuck Abell has been instrumental in "squaring up" the tunes as solid 4/4 numbers, so they work as contra dance music. Caller Margaret Mathews works the contra calls in between the lyrics.

Her description of the process follows.

Two evenings during the last full weeks of January were spent with Blue Dance, listening and observing multitalented musicians shape popular tunes to fit within the framework of contra dance. What happens when you take Van Morrison's "Domino" and square it to fit 64 bars of music? Or Lou Rawls' "You'll Never Find Another Love Like Mine" or The Beatles' "While My Guitar Gently Weeps"? Each tune set evolved into a particular feel: some smooth, some swingy, some more rock and roll or calypso in beat. How does a caller work with such variety of musical genres?

Creating a satisfying dance program is an art acquired over decades of musically backing talented callers and having the opportunity to call for various communities and small festivals in the U.S. and Canada. Some is obvious, at least to callers. Tunes with a smooth feel call for flowing dances, with little or no balances. Rock and roll or calypso beats cry for balances and lots of them.

With this type of contra dance evening, a key component is to allow the dancers to simply groove on the music, enjoy the singers in the band, sing along if they wish. With that in mind, simpler dances work best, meaning dances with less moves per beat and, therefore, easier for dancers to remember. My goal is to be able to back out of calling early in the dance while continuing to keep an eye on the dancers. When it looks like a little more support is needed, there is always space to add a word or two. That space happens between phrases of songs. The singers pause, I add a word "swing," "chain," or "hey."

One more evening of rehearsal with Blue Dance before the February 2nd dance. There will be an opportunity to run through some of the dance program with the band to see if the dances chosen really fit the mood of a particular tune. It's a time for fine tuning the program while keeping in mind there may be changes in the program the night of the dance if needed.

By the time this article reaches your home, February 2 contra evening with Blue Dance will be history, leaving you, the dancers, with good vibes of an evening well spent. Let's do it again!!

2017 CDR Dance Scholarship

We are pleased to announce that applications are now being accepted for the 2017 Country Dancers of Rochester Dance Scholarship! Last year we received several excellent submissions and awarded Meg Grindrod a scholarship to Maine Fiddle Camp. She had a great time at camp and has brought home her new musical knowledge and great camp experiences to share with our community.

This year we're again opening our scholarship opportunity to all members of our community (callers, musicians, sound techs and organizers as well as dancers), to apply for funds to attend a camp, seminar, or other activity related to our mission of furthering the preservation, study, teaching, enjoyment and continuing evolution of English and American traditional and historical dance and dance music. Here are the requirements to be considered eligible for a scholarship:

- · All applicants must have an active membership with CDR.
- Applicants must state the benefit that his or her proposed activity will bring to the Country Dancers of Rochester community.
- Proposed scholarship activities MUST be related to English and American traditional and historical dance and/or music. A preference will be given to applications that are directly related to Contra or English country dancing.

The Music

The ball this year will feature the music of three much loved musicians who are familiar to dancers in our area: Jane Knoeck on keyboard, Eileen Nicholson Kalfass on violin and Rebecca McCallum on violin.

Jane Knoeck's musical beginnings were in classical piano and voice studies. She entered the instrumental folk music world upon discovering the hammered dulcimer. Contra dance bands followed and she's been playing for dances ever since on piano and accordion, weaving a variety of musical influences into her style.

Eileen Nicholson Kalfass began studying violin at age 4 as a classical Suzuki violin student. Her appreciation of fiddle music followed soon thereafter as a result of her family's interest in folk arts. Her playing combines an unforgettably smooth and pleasing tone with the solid rhythm dancers appreciate.

Rebecca McCallum grew up playing classical violin, but in college, she fell in love with contra dancing, and soon abandoned classical music for the fiddle. Nothing gives Rebecca greater musical joy than creating lift, energy and drive for a roomful of dancers. A member of the Groovemongers since 1997, Rebecca plays for contra dancers across the US and overseas.

The Program

This year's Jane Austen Ball will provide a full weekend of activities on May 6 and 7, but the excitement starts much earlier. Dancers wishing to be fully prepared for the ball are encouraged to attend as many of our ball prep sessions as possible. A potluck supper and an evening of spirited English country dance will follow each session.

On Saturday afternoon, May 6, there will be preparation session for the ball at the First Baptist Church. This will also be followed by a potluck supper. Then, in the evening, we will have a dance for experienced dancers. The dances will be called, but walk through will be limited, and the program will feature more challenging dances.

Finally, on Sunday, May 7, we will gather at our beautiful venue. An optional breakfast will be offered. In the morning we will walk through all the dances on the ball program. Following the practice there will be a lunch consisting of three entrees, soup, salad and desert. After lunch there will be ample time to change into ball dress. Then we will dance through the afternoon, reliving the times and tunes of Jane Austen. A break with elegant refreshments will be provided. After the ball those who wish will gather for dinner at a local restaurant.

 Committee that chooses scholarship winners for dance camp needs 2 more members -- see a planning committee member if you're interested!


Dance cancellation policy
